

Productivity, GDP, and Median Household Income





## **Key Points**

- The global and American economies are going through profound structural change. We have entered a new economic era, different from those which have come before.
- Every day Americans were suffering long before the Great Recession began, and thus no one wants to go back to that old economy. "Recovery" should not be the goal of our economic strategy. "New Foundation" is closer to the mark.
- No matter what government does this year, structural dynamics will likely keep the unemployment numbers steady or even worse through November 2010.
- What Americans have been, and are still looking for, is a plan for them and their families. The lack of focus on the economy in 2009 has been harmful.
- Repackage your agenda stimulus, health care, energy, education/community colleges, financial services reform, immigration reform, opening foreign markets, etc into a "new economic strategy for America" and govern and run on this new plan all next year.
- At the core of this plan is an understanding the rest of the world is catching up to America, and that if we don't do more invest, reform, modernize, innovate we will fall behind. We need to raise our game, not retreat from our challenges.
